A Message from Pastor Joe

Dear Friends in Christ at the Elijah Kellogg Church,

As I have stated, I am a Vietnam veteran. So I would be remiss if I did not note this Saturday, 11/11, is Veteran's Day. This is a short history of Veterans Day adapted from the website of the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

World War I— known at the time as *The Great War*— ended with the Treaty of Versailles, signed on June 28, 1919. Fighting had ceased seven months earlier with an armistice, a cessation of hostilities, between the Allies and Germany. That armistice went into effect on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

So in November 1919, President Wilson proclaimed November 11th as Armistice Day. The original concept for the celebration was for a day observed with parades, public meetings and a brief suspension of business beginning at 11:00 a.m.

An Act approved in 1938 made the 11th of November a Federal holiday— a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace— to be thereafter celebrated as "Armistice Day," primarily set aside to honor veterans of World War I. In 1954, after World War II, after Americans had fought aggression in Korea, Congress amended the Act of 1938 by

striking the word "Armistice" and inserting the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

The Uniform Holiday Bill of 1968 was intended to ensure three-day weekends by celebrating four national holidays on Mondays: Washington's Birthday (now known as President's Day), Memorial Day, Veterans Day and Columbus Day (A.K.A. Indigenous Peoples' Day). The first Veterans Day under the new law was observed with much confusion in 1971. In 1975 another bill returned the annual observance of Veterans Day to its original date starting in 1978.

So Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11th no matter which day of the week on which it falls. The restoration of the observance of Veterans Day to November 11th preserves the history of the date and helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: a celebration to honor America's veterans for their patriotism, love of country and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good. Of course, veterans know the need for the original intent of the day: a day dedicated to the cause of world peace.


