INTRODUCTION TO SCRIPTURE

A READING FROM THE EPISTLES — Philippians 2:1-13 [ILV]

[1] If then there is any encouragement in Christ, if our life in Christ means anything to you, if our life in the Spirit means anything to you, if love or compassion or sympathy can persuade you at all, [2] then make my joy complete: be united in your convictions and united in your love; be of the same mind, having the same love, be in full accord and of one mind, a common mind. [3] There must be no competition among you; do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit; in humility regard others as better than yourselves, value others over yourselves. [4] Let each of you think of the interests of others before your own. [5] Your attitude must be the same as was in Christ, Jesus:

[6] Christ, though being in the image of God, did not deem equality with God as something to be clung to—
[7] but instead emptied self, taking on the form of a servant, the form of oppressed humankind, being born in human likeness, into the human condition.

[8] Jesus was thus humbled and became obedient to the point of death even death on a cross!

[9] Therefore God also highly exalted Jesus and gave Jesus the name that is above every name,
[10] so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
[11] and every tongue should proclaim to the glory of God that Jesus, the Christ, reigns supreme.

[12] Therefore, my dear friends, just as you have always obeyed my urging, not only when I happen to be with you, but all the more now that I am no longer there, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling; [13] for it is God who is at work in you, enabling in you the desire both to do the will of God and to do the work of God.

INTRODUCTION TO SCRIPTURE

A READING FROM THE GOSPELS — Matthew 21:23-32 [ILV]

[23] Jesus entered the temple precincts and began teaching. The chief priests and the elders of the people, the religious authorities, came and said, "By what authority are you doing what you do? Who gave you this authority?"

[24] Jesus replied, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. [25] From where did the right of John to baptize come? Did it come from divine origin or did it come from human origin?"

And they then discussed this question among themselves. "If we say, 'From heaven, from divine origin' Jesus will respond, 'Why, then, did you refuse to believe John?' [26] But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we will have the people to fear, for all regard John as a prophet." [27] So they replied to Jesus, "We do not know."

And Jesus said in reply, "Neither, then, will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things."

[28] Jesus continued: "What do you think? A landowner who had two children went to the older one and said, 'My child, go and work in the vineyard today.' [29] The child responded, 'I will not' but afterwards regretted it and went. [30] The landowner then went to the second child and said the same thing. This child responded, 'I am on my way' but never went. [31] Which of the two did what was wanted?"

The chief priests and the elders of the people, the religious authorities said, "The first."

Jesus said to them, "The truth is, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the dominion of God, heaven, before you. [32] When John came to you walking on the road of righteousness— a right relationship with God— and justice, you did not believe, but tax collectors and prostitutes did. Yet, even after you saw that, you did not change your minds, you did not repent and believe.







Board of Finance

A few people approached me after last Sunday's special meeting and said they wished there'd been more context for the vote to authorize the release of funds for our mold remediation project. So here is a summary that I hope fits the bill.

Last year we discovered we had mold in the basement and the Trustees set about finding a contractor that could assess the scale of the problem and provide an estimate for remediation. In October, we received a generous donation of \$25,000 to address the problem.

By the time our annual meeting rolled around in February, we had one estimate in hand and it was in excess of \$100,000. Given that we were still researching the scale of the problem and appropriate remediation and mitigation options, we decided at the annual meeting not to vote on approving the funds needed for the project until we had more information. A Mold Remediation Task Force was created to help Trustees address this problem.

Since then, a cadre of volunteers emptied out the basement rooms, cutting the cost of some of the remediation work.

We received another quote for the remediation work, this one closer to \$65,000. Additionally, the Trustees were in talks with a couple of companies on how to mitigate the problem so the mold never returns. As of this writing, the Trustees are modifying the contract with Mold Bros. to clarify some points raised by our attorney. Assuming all goes well, we hope to begin the remediation part of the work in October. Trustees are also closing in on a mitigation option with a company, TC Hafford, that should run about \$40,000. Thankfully, Helen Norton, our generous donor in 2022, sent us a check for \$75,000 this summer to cover most of the mold work. Between her generous donations and savings we're seeing in our budget, we expect to be able to cover the cost of the project.

Our church bylaws require that we convene a special meeting of the congregation whenever we want to spend in excess of \$2,000 for any non-budgeted item. That was the reason for last Sunday's meeting and vote.

Our hope is the contracts will be finalized soon and work can begin. The Trustees and the Mold Remediation Task Force members have done and continue to do exceptional work on our behalf. We are lucky to have such diligent stewards of EKC.
