INTRODUCTION TO SCRIPTURE

A READING FROM THE EPISTLES — Philemon 1-21

- [1] This is a letter from Paul, a prisoner for Christ Jesus, and from Timothy our brother. It is written to Philemon our dear friend and co-worker [2] and to Apphia our sister, to Archippus our companion in the struggle and to the church in your house:
 - [3] Grace and peace from Abba, God, and our Savior, Jesus, the Christ.
- [4] I always mention you in my prayers, I thank God for you [5] because I hear of the love and faith you have for our Savior, Jesus, and for all the saints. [6] I pray that you will be active in sharing your faith so that you will fully understand all the good that we are able to do for the sake of Christ.
- [7] I, indeed, find great joy, encouragement and comfort in your love, because through you, the hearts of the holy ones, the saints have been refreshed.
- [8] For this reason, though I feel I have every right in Christ to command you to do what ought to be done, your duty, [9] I would rather appeal to you in the name of love. Yes, I, Paul, an ambassador and now a prisoner for Christ, appeal to you for my child, [10] Onesimus, of whom I have become a parent, a father, during my imprisonment. This one has truly become Onesimus—"Useful" [11] For he who was formerly useless to you is now, indeed, useful both to you and to me. [12] I am sending him back to you. That means I am that I am sending my own heart.re
- [13] I wanted to keep him with me, so that he might help me in your place during my imprisonment for the Good News; [14] but I did not want to do anything without your consent, so that a kindness might be voluntary, not forced on you but freely bestowed. [15] Perhaps this is the reason he was separated from you for a while—that you might have him back forever, [16] no longer as a subordinate but as more—a beloved brother—especially dear to me. And now much more dear to you, since now you will know him both in the flesh and in Christ.
- [17] So if you consider me, regard me as your partner, welcome Onesimus as you would welcome me. [18] If this one has wronged you, done you injury in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account. [19] I, Paul, am writing this with my own hand: I will repay it. I will say nothing, I will not mention that you owe me your very self.
- [20] Yes, you see, my friend, let me have this benefit from you in Christ! I want to make you useful to me in Christ! Refresh this heart of mine in Christ! [21] I write with complete confidence in your obedience, since I am sure you will do even more than I ask.




